Who in your community might be a key stakeholder or partner in your work?

One of the first steps on your Age-Friendly Journey is to recruit members for your Committee who are inclusive of all ages and representative of various sectors in your community. The Committee must include older adults.

The Age-Friendly Committee will act as a coordinating advisory group that will engage others in the community for different Action projects. When a project is planned, there could easily be another 6 to 10 stakeholders or partners involved or another group may agree to take leadership.
